

Public Attitudes on Immigration

August Battleground Survey Results

Presented by Global Strategy Group



Key Findings

- The presidential battleground is toss-up with Harris running similar to Biden in 2020, but ahead of where Biden was earlier this year.
- Voters want a new approach to immigration, but Harris has substantial work to convince
 voters that she will do that. While voters have more hope for Harris on immigration, few
 believe her approach will be different than Biden meaning Harris starts at a deficit on this
 issue.
- Securing the border is the top immigration priority for voters, including those who want to see Harris take a different approach than Biden. Despite recent news, most voters believe illegal crossings at the border are going up.
- Voters want to make sure security is included and a focus in all their solutions, but they
 continue to find appealing immigrant-focused proposals like fixing the legal immigration
 system and creating a pathway to citizenship and the combination of these with security
 is more popular than border security on its own.
- Trump continues to have his own vulnerabilities on immigration, especially around family separation. When this is combined with a Harris positive message that hits the right notes, Trump's advantage on the issue can be eroded. Trump's cruel family separation policies from the past remain much more unpopular than some of his future promises on immigration, and it's important to link family separation to his future plans.


Battleground voters prioritize the economy, especially swing voters, while the importance of immigration and the border is largely driven by right-leaning opposition voters




Voters have more hope for Harris on immigration than they did for Biden, but she has a lot of work to do convincing voters that she will take the right approach



The bipartisan immigration deal is broadly popular, but blame for its failure is mixed and voters move to partisan corners when debating its merits

As you may know, earlier this year, a bipartisan immigration deal was negotiated between Republicans and Democrats to increase funding for border security and make it more difficult for migrants to claim asylum. However, Congress did not pass it into law. What do you think should have happened with this bill?



On a separate question, 36% of voters believe Donald Trump and Republicans in Congress are responsible for stopping this bill, while 35% believe Joe Biden and Democrats in Congress are responsible, and 16% believe they are equally responsible.



Preferred Focus of Next President

- Some people say it is important to focus on securing the southern border, ensuring that we reduce illegal immigration and keep our country safe and secure
- Some people say it is important to focus on keeping families together, ensuring children and immigrants who have lived here for many years have a path to staying in the country legally





One challenge with focusing exclusively on the border is that even when the numbers drop, voters don't believe it – making it hard to win an argument about progress on this issue

As far as you know, compared to <u>a few years ago</u>, have the number of illegal crossings at the southern border gone up, down, or are they about the same?*




As far as you know, compared to **the end of last year (2023),** have the number of illegal crossings at the southern border gone up, down, or are they about the same?**






Trump's family separation policy remains incredibly unpopular and is even net negative with Trump's base of support

Key Takeaways

- Harris needs to convince voters that she will take a new and different approach on immigration that is active and addresses border security, but still differentiates from Trump by offering common sense solutions for the future. While securing the border is critical to convey, voters also respond to ideas around fixing the legal immigration system and keeping families together, which differentiate Harris from Trump's less popular enforcement-only approach.
- Talking about providing safe, legal ways for immigrants who follow the rules to contribute
 to the country is an effective way of doing that. In multiple places in the poll, this language
 does well, whether it's in the context of fixing the system, keeping families together, or
 legalizing specified populations of undocumented immigrants.
- Trump has his share of vulnerabilities on the issue, especially around family separation. Killing the border deal is one piece of that but it's not the only vulnerability. Swing voters, in particular, detest Trump's cruel family separation policies and his anti-immigrant posture.
- Voters are more negative to some of the mechanisms of mass deportation, such as family separation and rounding up people in communities, than to mass deportation in the abstract.



"When I'm elected, I'll bring a new approach and solutions on day one. No more playing politics; no more inaction and delay. Donald Trump blew up a bipartisan border security deal I helped negotiate with conservative Republicans because he's selfish, only cares about himself, and thought doing so would help him politically. He only promises chaos and to resume his horrible family separation policy, to take kids from their parents and expand it to rip apart millions of families across the country. I'll secure the border. I'll finally get an earned pathway to citizenship done. We can keep families together and secure the border. No more politics. I'm taking a new, serious approach and getting this done."
